
Starting Smart and Strong

- ☐ Starting Smart and Strong is a 10-year initiative that supports three communities (Fresno, San Jose, and Oakland) in helping all the adults in children's lives access resources, coaching, and support to meet the needs of each child.
- ☐ Fresno is currently in our fifth year (2019-2020) of the initiative. Our two main goals to date are:
 - Improve professional development and training for caregivers and educators
 - Provide resources and support for parents, family, friends, neighbors, and other informal caregivers
- ☐ Fresno community partners participating/collaborating in the Starting Smart and Strong, include Central Valley Children's Services Network, Fresno Economic Opportunity Commission, Fresno County Superintendent of Schools, Fresno Housing Authority, and First 5 Fresno County.

Goal 1: Improve professional development and training for caregivers and educators

How: The Fresno Language Project was created with partner agencies to ensure all children have a strong early language foundation upon entering kindergarten. The project is implementing innovative practices—including Personalized Oral Language(s) Learning Strategies (POLLS), which are concrete approaches that support learning in all environments, and professional development trainings. POLLS was developed and written by Dr. Linda Espinosa, Early Learning Expert, who leads the trainings alongside co-author of Getting it RIGHT for Young Children from Diverse Backgrounds: Applying Research to Improve Practice, Elizabeth Magruder.

Goal 2: Provide resources and support for parents, family, friends, neighbors, and other informal caregivers

How: Developed by the Fresno Housing Authority and Fresno Unified School District with support from the David and Lucile Packard Foundation, Helm Home-Play & Learn Center enhances the skills of parents, extended family, and other informal caregivers to improve the quality of adult-child interactions in all settings so that kids are on track for school and for life. This is supported through:

- □ Play and Learn Groups: provide children with an opportunity to explore dramatic play, music, literacy, sensory, art, and math activities. These activities improve children's cognitive, gross and fine motor skills, language and communication, and exploration skills as well as support social-emotional development.
- □ Parents Workshops: a variety of workshops for parents and informal caregivers, including Abriendo Puertas. Abriendo Puertas / Opening Doors is the nation's first evidence-based comprehensive training program developed by and for Latino parents with children ages 0-5. The workshops are intentionally designed to reinforce and validate the importance of parents' engagement in their children's lives.

Outcomes to date:

- Caregivers refer to helm home as a "support network"
- Increased awareness of developmental milestones & supports needed
- Increased patience when managing children's behavior
- ☐ Participants recommend expanding program to serve others

Caregiver feedback:

- "It's the first time I'm seeing my son so excited to learn."
- "My daughter never sang before and now she knows three songs and sings in the car and house."
- □"I like the opportunity to meet other moms and learn new activities together, like painting. Some parents don't have stuff like that at home."
