



Parent's Guide to Choosing Child Care - Tip Sheet

Who Licenses Child Care Facilities?

The Department of Social Services, Community Care Licensing Division, (CCLD) Child Care Program licenses child care facilities. As a condition of licensure, licensed facilities must comply with health and safety requirements when supervising children in care. The program protects the children through oversight centered around the prevention of violations of these requirements, compliance assistance and enforcement action.

Are There Laws Around Child Care Facilities?

Yes. Licensed child care facilities are required to meet baseline health and safety requirements e.g., background clearance, CPR/first aid, and fire clearances.

What are the Types of Licensed Child Care Facilities?

Child Care Facilities are less than 24-hour care, offered in residential settings e.g., a caregiver's own home or commercial settings and serve children from 0-18 years of age:

- Child Care Centers
- Infants, ages 0-24 months
- <u>Preschool Children</u>, ages two (2) years to and not yet enrolled in kindergarten or 1st grade
- <u>School-Age Children</u>, enrolled in kindergarten or 1st grade on up. Non-Minor individuals may be served up to 22 years old, as defined by Health and Safety Code Section <u>1596.862</u>
- Centers for <u>Mildly III Children</u>, serve children who are too ill to attend child care
- <u>Family Child Care Homes</u> serve children in a residential setting.

How Do I Know if a Child Care Facility is Licensed or if a Facility Has Complaints?

- View facility licensing information, inspection reports and complaint reports on the CCLD facility <u>Transparency Site</u> or by contacting a <u>Regional Office</u> to schedule time to review a provider's public file.
